

Teal – NDC

- Unifying the downtown;
- Unifying the Country Club with the Pointe Marin HOA;
- Combining Hamilton with Pacheco Valley, and then up to Stonetree;
- Separating Bahia from Hamilton/Stonetree;
- Connecting Bahia to San Marin, and including the area down to Olive;
- Not letting the freeway be too much of a boundary (two of the five districts have substantial population on both sides it).

101 – Bertie Freeberg – Slight Adjustment to Green Map

District 1 includes the San Marin Smart Station and some of the North Redwood Blvd. corridor just north of Olive Drive. However, Rush Landing Road (west of the train tracks) should be included within District 1 – due to its close proximity to the train station and to the Wood Hollow Drive neighborhood. The entrance to both areas are directly across from each other. The population count with this addition is -0-.

NDC note: the population change is actually 4 people moved from D5 to D1.

102 – Bertie Freeberg – Slight Adjustment to Purple Map

The San Marin Train Station and Rush Landing Road are within the same District 1. Please include some of the North Redwood Blvd. Corridor within District 1 (at least to Pinhero Circle) similar to what is shown on the City of Novato 2014 Existing Conditions Report Map prepared for the General Plan Update. The Atherton Ranch neighborhood and Partridge Knolls II neighborhood (both adjacent to Redwood Blvd. are communities of interest. Again, this will not change the census count.

103 – Bertie Freeberg – Slight Adjustment to Orange Map

Rush Landing Road (west of train tracks) should be included in the same District as the San Marin Smart Train Station (District 2) due to its proximity to the station and to the Wood Hollow Drive neighborhood. This will not change the census count at all or take away from the business and commercial count because District 5 already has an abundance of it.

NDC note: the population change is actually 4 people moved from D5 to D1.

104 – Tina G McMillan

Here is my map for the redistricting. It is closest to the Green Map with a larger Downtown extended through Virginia Avenue. If Drew and Athas are willing to be in the same District I would keep the Square in West Novato by putting everything south of Novato Blvd on the District 2 side. Then I would add back in the 1166 population number from Downtown (Virginia to Simmons) to North West Novato District 1. I don't believe the consultants will purposefully put two council members in the same District which is why I added Virginia and surrounding areas to Downtown.

108 – Patty Hoyt

This plan logically combines Hamilton with Ignacio to form South and Bahia and parts of San Marin to form North-East. Downtown is a separate district, not carved up. My basis for this: addressing the issues in the CRVA while keeping nearly all neighborhoods intact AND focusing on what is good for RESIDENTS in each district. It doesn't address Novato business owners because that should not be a consideration. We are to focus on residents only.

109 – Kevin Morrison

This is 90% Patty Hoyt's map with a few changes at the edges of a few districts. It retains the salient big ideas a. Hamilton and Ignacio are united. Country Club-to-Presidents inform, Central c. West Novato is largely coherent. North-East combining virtually all of North and East Novato, nevertheless is the most difficult to populate. Downtown stands as its own district, not attached to outlying districts. It's surprisingly difficult to hit the target population for each district partly because the smallest unit of population is a census block. Census blocks vary wildly in size and density and they don't necessarily reflect modern neighborhood boundaries. Like Patty, I didn't take incumbent addresses into consideration, which led to one change in the Central and South districts. Patty's map has Eklund and Fryday in the same district. mine has Eklund and Lucan in the same district.

112 – Tracey Ruiz

This is a refined version of my earlier submission v1, which I would like to replace with this version. I did not completely know the parameters or goals set by council and the deviation allowance when I did the first version. The primary feature is that Hamilton is a Southern District and Marin Country Club and Pointe Marin are joined. The Downtown is primarily in District 3.

Hamilton is a southern district; Marin County Club and Pointe Marin are combined; Downtown west of Redwood is in District 2; Downtown east of Redwood is in District 3.

114 – Tracey Ruiz

This map is a variation on my submissions V2 and V3. This one has all of the Downtown in District 3.

115 – Zachary Griggy

This map provides five contiguous districts each home to a different incumbent. The largest population deviation is 6.8 percent, between districts 2 and 5. This map aims to preserve communities of interest and prevent them from being split up as much as possible. The communities were the San Ramon, San Marin Neighborhoods, Hamilton neighborhoods, Downtown and neighborhoods along Center Rd. Odd-numbered districts are home to incumbents up for re-election in 2019. Pam Drew lives in District 1, which includes much of the neighborhoods located off of San Marin Dr and Simmons Ln. Eric Lucan lives in District 3, which includes the neighborhood around Novato HS downtown Novato Olive and Bahia. Josh Fryday lives in District 5, which includes Hamilton and most of southern Novato. Incumbents Denise Athas and Pat Eklund, who are up for re-election in 2022 live in districts 2 and 4 respectively. District 2 includes the neighborhoods off of Center Rd and Sutro Ave. District 4 includes most of the Ignacio Valley and the neighborhoods around Midway Blvd and Lynwood Elementary School.

116 – Zachary Griggy

All districts are contiguous and have an acceptable level of population deviation: the largest deviation is 8.5 percent between districts 1 and 5. Incumbents live in different districts, and those up for re-election in 2019 live in odd-numbered districts. Josh Fryday lives in District 1, which includes Hamilton and most of the southernmost neighborhoods in Novato. Pat Eklund lives in District 2, which includes much of the Ignacio Valley and the neighborhoods around Midway Blvd and Lynwood Elementary School. Eric Lucan lives in District 3, which includes the neighborhoods around Rancho and Lu Sutton elementary schools. Denise Athas lives in District 4, which includes most of the neighborhoods located off of San Marin Dr and Sutro Ave. Pam Drew lives in District 5, which includes both downtown AND its immediate surrounding neighborhoods, Olive and the neighborhoods southeast of Miwok Park. This last addition ensures Drew lives within the district boundaries. Novato Creek provides a natural boundary for parts of District 5.
